Iwi hosts Waitangi celebration

10,000 expected to largest regional celebration

> zāti Kahungunu Iwi Inc is proud to host the 24th annual Waitangi Day Family Celebrations, commemorating the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi between Ngāti Kahungunu and the Crown. This event is the largest regional celebration on our national day and is the only regional event in New Zealand organised and largely funded by an iwi. This year, we are sharing the message of unity.

> Waitangi Day is a free event, accessible to everyone in the community. The Mitre10 Sports Park is an ideal venue, offering all the amenities needed to host a large public gathering, including off-road parking for over 2000 vehicles and drinking water fountains in the front and rear of the 2000-seat grandstand.

The event is expected to draw a crowd of over 10,000 people as there are no other major events planned locally on the day. The celebrations will feature a variety of activities that appeal to all ages, with key elements being learning, fun, and interaction between Ngāti Kahungunu. other iwi, and our diverse communities in

Toi Matarua lays leadership path

By rangatahi, for rangatahi – roopu broadens from performance into research and promotion of wellbeing

any people think rangatahi (youth-aged) Māori are troublemakers, that we don't care about school, or we lack ambition. These stereotypes hide the truth about our strengths, talents and the things we are actually interested in.

This article is a monthly series in Tihei Kahungunu. Our stories represent the voice of rangatahi in our Toi Matarua (TM) rangatahi roopu. We call our series "Pakaru Pānui". Sharing content that is true to the rangatahi Māori experience is so important to us! Which is why TM have employed our expert rangatahi communications team, "Pakaru Pānui", to lead our online community engagement.

TM – Toi Matarua is a rangatahi/youth programme to help enable rangatahi to navigate their future by becoming leaders within their communities. It was established in 2011 as a "by rangatahi, for rangatahi" performing arts group to help understand mental health and suicide prevention. The programme has transformed into an emerging, rangatahiled research organisation that specialises in health and wellbeing, social and justice issues pertaining to Māori. We proudly



continue to be a voice for rangatahi and we are grateful that we can speak in this Tihei Kahungunu monthly edition.

Last year "Pakaru Pānui" featured nine times in Tihei Kahungunu. We participated in 26 rangatahi events and engaged on several social media platforms that rangatahi view. However. we are keen to ensure we are understood and that our voice is heard and read by older generations, who sometimes misunderstand our view.

Our top moments:
In August, Toi Matarua attended the LEGO

Family Spirit Conference 2024 in Alice Springs, Australia. The event brought together indigenous groups like the Māori, First Nations British Columbians, Native Americans and the Arrernte, who were the hosts. During the week, people shared their cultures and talked about how to create spaces where tamariki could play.

In November Toi Matarua showcased the production *Undiscovered*. We performed three shows, one in Hamilton and two in Napier.

We had four wananga in preparation for our show. We learnt all the show content such as dance, haka, waiata, contemporary haka and acting. We had professional dance tutors come in to teach us some sets as well as a Mau Rākau tutor. The show was based on the story of Urutengangana, the God of light in Māori mythology, the first-born child of the primordial parents, Ranginui the Sky Father and Papatūānuku Mother Earth. In August, Toi Matarua held a four-day

rangatahi wellbeing wānanga in Rotorua. Rangatahi from Kahungunu and all over the North Island came to be the first to listen to our rangatahi audiobook *Kia Au, Ko Au.* The wānanga taught rangatahi tools for improving sleep, including Dr Sally Rye's "Rongo ā puku" exercises traditional oriori, meditation, sound and therapy. Our audiobook was made available on platforms including Spotify, YouTube and our website, toimatarua. com, as a tool for healing and better sleep.
Last year we rebranded our social

enterprise, Māku. We went out into the community to sell our kawakawa balms and attend multiple markets and events in Hawke's Bay, we also set up our online store and now you can buy our balms at

https://www.maku-organics.com/.
Towards the end of the year we were lucky enough to attend the Hīkoi mō te Tiriti. We took a small group of rangatahi to Wellington. We woke at 2.30am to join the hīkoi in Petone and walk into central Wellington – it was a long walk but we were encouraged and inspired by the nannies and pēpi walking alongside us. Despite our tiredness, we pushed through because we knew we were a part of something historically significant to our culture and generation.

Last year was one we won't forget and we look forward to doing more amazing kaupapa this year.

All participants must register for Ngāti Kahungunu board elections

The Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi Incorporated (NKII) Board Elections take place every three years.

Nine elections take place simultaneously for ten positions on the Board as follows: The election of six Taiwhenua/Rohe representatives, two Taurahere representatives (from the new Northern and Southern Districts), one kaumātua representative and chairman

All members currently on the NKII Board were participants of the 2022 NKII Board election process except for Jenny Nelson-Smith, who was appointed after the passing of the late John Barry Heperi-

All participants whether candidates, nominators or voters, must be registered

to participate in this election.
All registered participants must be Nga Uri a Kahungunu – descendants of Kahungunu. 18 years of age or over at the time of the election which is April 24

Nominations for these board positions open on February 3.

Those eligible to stand for positions will be informed directly.

Nominations close on February 28 and on March 4a notice will be made public to announce the candidates.

On March 24, voting papers will be posted to all registered iwi members who are eligible to vote as noted above.

The Taiwhenua/Rohe Boards are made up of registered marae representatives who have been appointed or elected by their respective marae and/or they have been elected in accordance to their own

older; be interested in the future of Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi; be registered to participate in the 2025 election; be proficient in Kahungunu tikanga, kawa and reo; and, reside in the Kahungunu

Nominations for the Iwi chair position will come from the pool of Taiwhenua Board members who meet the criteria requirement at the time nominations open for the iwi election which is

t the beginning of the year Waka Ama Aotearoa New Zealand hosts the National Sprint Championships at Lake Karapiro. This year's event took place from January 12-18 and participants came from all over the country to put their hard training into action.

Each year the Te Rau Oranga O Ngāti Kahungunu Waka Ama Club puts forward its teams. This year the club had 110 paddlers competing in teams ranging from midgets (the youngest paddlers were 6 ears old) to senior master women (over 50 years old).

"Bobby's gold medal race was a highlight for all of us," said Julie Tangaere, the club chairperson. "He was strong

throughout the regatta and his size, strength, power and determination came through as we all watched in awe as he did his thing and achieved first place and won his gold medal in the intermediate boys W1 singles race.

The win was even more poignant because up to the day before the tournament we were struggling to find a waka that could actually accommodate Bobby's frame and size. He had tried a few different waka which he kept falling out of and struggled to stabilise. Thankfully, Jorian (Julie's son) was able to source a good waka from a friend and, after testing it a couple of times, it was the waka he used and medalled in.'

Bobby is a 12-year-old former student of Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Te Ara Hou. This year he heads off to high school at Hato Paora College in Fielding. He and his older brother, Leedti, have been a part of the club since they were midgets. Like all other local kids, they came to give waka ama a try and they were hooked. "What all new whānau discover when

they come to Te Rau Oranga is that waka ama is more than just a sport for us. It's a way of life," says Tangaere.

"The wairua, whānaungatanga and manaakitanga are a big part of the waka ama vibe and it's what brings our whānau back to the club year after year"

Friends prepare for Finnish adventure

Four-week cultural exchange aims to empower teenage ambassadors

> assionate educator and rangatahi leader Te Whiti Seeds has created an opportunity of a lifetime for two Hastings boys

Kalel Wairau and D'Artagnan King will travel to Finland on February 5 and spend four weeks visiting schools to share stories of their upbringing.
They will also have a cultural exchange

of experiences with rangatahi and their families in Finland.

Kalel and D'Artagnan, both 15, have been friends since they were in primary

They both live in Hastings and attend

Karamū High School. The chance to visit Finland is a first-time experience for both of them.

Seeds, who teaches at Taikura Rudolf Steiner in Hastings, is the founder of He Rangatahi Pounamu, a non-profit organisation for youth leadership through an ambassador programme where youngsters between 14 and 17 travel to Finland to build their experience and future opportunities.

Seeds had the opportunity as a teenager to travel to Finland in 2000.

He said he was and is still overwhelmed, and has deep respect and love for the Finnish people, after the love and light they shared with him during his

"This teenage experience has helped me to circumnavigate trials, tribulations, $relationships, languages, culture\, and\,$

understand my own personal tūrangawaewae', standing place or identity," said Seeds.

He believed that opportunity helped him to aspire to become a teacher and help youth navigate through life and reach their own potential.

"The power that I have experienced through my travels to Finland and meeting my new Finnish family, and making friends from all over the world is empowering," he said. Kalel was first approached by Seeds

about being on the He Rangatahi Pounamu ambassador programme, then later brought D'Artagnan along.

A set of questions was asked and a parents' interview took place.

The opportunity for travel was put to the boys and their parents.

They needed to prove their

commitment and support from their parents because the trip is costing about \$14,000 each. As soon as it was confirmed. families started to raise funds for the trip.

Seeds and support worker Tracy Mclean, Kalel's mum, will travel with the pair to Finland.

The boys are super excited about their opportunity.

The real gems will be revealed as the boys develop meaningful respect for self and others and come to understand their own personal tūrangawaewae

Watch this space, the future looks brighter already.

Feb 6: Walk of unity, talk of unity

Focus of Waitangi Day celebration on moving forward together

ow we can move forward and live together well is the focus of $Wait angi\,Day\,commemorations$ at Clive's Farndon Park on February 6.

This annual historic event, close to Waipureku, where Te Tiriti was signed in 1840, promises opportunities for reflection and action.

The day starts at 7.45am at Åtea a Rangi, Waitangi Park, with karakia, followed by the Hikoi of Unity, a 3km walk to Farndon

Nau mai, haere mai – all are welcome,

and bring your flags!
The hikoi will pause at the Clive Bridge for karakia at the memorial plaque remembering the Kahungunu chiefs who signed Te Tiriti close by — Te Hapuku, Hoani Waikato and Harawira Mahika Te

"The hīkoi is a beautiful and popular way to begin the day and an opportunity to reflect," says Waipureku Waitangi Trust chairwoman Maxine Boag.

Non-walkers will join the group riverside at 8.45am at Farndon Park for the haka pōwhiri, led by manawhenua This will be followed by speeches in the marquee first from keynote speaker Vincent O'Malley, then from local mayors and the chairman of the regional council.

"After the walk of unity we begin the talk of unity. Like the walk, the kaupapa of the day is about remembering our history as we move forward together. It's kotahitanga in action," Boag said.

"The focus is how are we all – tangata whenua and tangata Tiriti – moving forward in honouring Te Tiriti in

partnership, as individuals, as collectives, as a region and as a nation?
"With the bicentennial of Te Tiriti just

16 years away in 2040, it's high time the promises made and the promise of Te Tiriti were widely understood. We need to talk about the promises broken too.

Award-winning historian and author Vincent O'Malley will deliver the keynote speech at 9.45am. He has worked as a professional historian focused mainly on Treaty of Waitangi claims research since $1993\,and\,in\,that\,time\,has\,prepared\,and$ presented many research reports on behalf of iwi around the country, including Te Matau-a-Maui Hawke's Bav. His books include the bestseller, The New Zealand Wars/Ngā Pakanga o Aotearoa. He

won the 2022 Ockham New Zealand Book Award for non-fiction for Voices from the New Zealand Wars/He Reo nō ngā Pakanga o Aotearoa, and he received a Prime Minister's Award for Literary Achievement that same year.

After kai o te ata (morning tea) at 10.30. a second session begins at 11am, with a range of speakers and workshops focusing on "honouring Te Tiriti o

Waitangi now and in the future". "The intention is to talk about the Treaty in ways that look out for everyone and are mana-enhancing for all, and then act on that. That is the spirit of Te Tiriti and the challenge is how we live up to it," Boag says.

Thought-provoking korero is being

recorded especially for the Waipureku commemoration by nationally and internationally famous speakers. The identities of these speakers, who are each providing 5-minute video presentations, will be revealed closer to the day.

Christian Fellowship is a local Church which has been operating since 1980. Situated on Flaxmere Avenue it draws people from around the Hastings and Napier area. This Pentecostal Church was birthed out of the Charismatic renewal of the late 1970's.

The main meeting is every Sunday morning starting 10:00. A Bible College also operates on Sunday evenings for those serious about advancing their knowledge of the Bible. Different groups run during the weekend which cater to youth ad adults. Children's Sunday school

classes run on a fortnightly basis during the Main Sunday service.
